Museums have been founded for a variety of purposes: to serve as recreational facilities, scholarly venues or educational resources, to contribute to the quality of life of the areas where they are situated; to attract tourism to a region; to promote civic pride or nationalistic endeavor or even to transmit overfly ideological concepts. This

era also saw the establishment of influential institutions like the Smithsonian Institution in 1823 and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1870. The international museum community came together with the formation of the International Council of Museums (ICOM) in 1946. In the contemporary era, from 2000 CE onwards, museums have adapted to the digital age, embracing online collections and interactive exhibits while prioritizing diversity, inclusivity, and community participation. Collaborative preservation efforts, cultural exchange programs, and addressing challenges posed by globalization and climate change have become paramount. Key milestones include UNESCO's establishment in 1945 and the adoption of the UNESCO World Heritage Convention in 1970. This historical trajectory underscores the transformation of museums from ancient storehouses to dynamic institutions dedicated to preserving cultural heritage, fostering cultural exchange, and engaging diverse audiences.

Museum is a building, place or an institution used for the collection, preservation and display of artifacts and other valuable cultural objects whether man - made or natural which has relevance to the people past and present (Banjoko, 2000). The preservation of important old and new objects and happenings are important to enlighten the society about their past achievements, while the new ones are on record for the present as much as they are for future generations. Lewis (2018) states that "Museum is an institution that preserves and interprets the materials evidence of the natural World". As such museum has a long history springing from what may be an innate human desire to collect and interpret and having discernible origins in large collections built up by individuals, groups, government and institutions. The context of interpreting the collected finds really has to do with the educational respect of the museum practice which also has to do with the effective learning of students. If the museum finds are not effectively interpreted to learners effectively, learning will never take place. Thus, for effective learning to take place through the interpretation of the Museum finds experts like trained curators and the likes should engaged to interpret the Museum finds. In our country Nigeria, museum practice has also existed a lot time ago and has contributed a lot in promoting and preserving our cultural artifacts. The origin of cultural resources development and control which could be regarded as the national museum services in Nigeria dates back to 1927 and is credited to Kenneth

C. Murray a one-time colonial art teacher of British origin. (Agberia and Chukueggu, 2010). Banjoko (2000) also states that, the collection and preservation of Nigerian artifacts seriously started in 1933 and 1943 through the campaigns mounted by E.H. Duckworth and K. C. Murray respectively. Okpoke (1992) clarified that on July 28, 1943, the colonial government in the country inaugurated the Nigeria Antiquities services. The board which had Kenneth C. Marry and a British ethnographer, Mr. E. H. Duckworth as members was commissioned to study the prospects of collecting and securing the nations antiquities with the sole aims of establishing museum services in some identifiable locations.

Deducing from the authors' statements it is obvious that the establishment of museum in Nigeria was initiated by Kenneth C. Murray. And the first museum established in Nigeria was the Esie museum in Kwara state of Nigeria and later followed by several other ones. The current museums that were later established houses different artifacts from different parts of the country. based on the reasons for which they are set up and the persons who are responsible for managing are known and called curators. But the worrying aspect of this paper and why this paper is carried out is based on the fact that despite the contributions and benefit that is derived from museum practice in the country it suffers a lot of challenges, which may be attributed to poor infrastructure, poor management, negative religious influence among others. Obi (2007) lamented that Nigeria museum remain dead ends, smell of neglect and despair and give little or no courage to anyone to regard our past and heritage with much enthusiasm. Obi (2007) also points out that the museum suffers poor finding, poor infrastructure, poor quality museum education officers, religious fundamentalism and apathy to museum education. All these enumerated has serious hindrance on the development of museum practice in our country and the learning of museum and gallery issues in our country.

Functions OF Museum
